## PATCH PROGRAM

*for all Girl Scouts during the 2012 membership year*



**100 Deeds Well Done**

In celebration of the 100<sup>th</sup> year of Girl Scouting, all members are challenged to complete 100 acts of community service. This is an individual girl project that can be done anytime during the 2012 membership year. Examples for each level include, but are not limited to:

### **Daisies**

- Make 100 cards to cheer up those in hospitals or nursing homes.
- Make 100 dog biscuits to donate to the local animal shelter.
- Collect 100 canned goods to donate to the local food cupboard.
- Recycle 100 grocery bags.
- Collect food to feed 100 pets for a day.

### **Brownies**

- Plant 100 flowers.
- Collect 100 baby supply items.
- Make 100 survival boxes with toiletry items for a local shelter.
- Make 100 baked goods to donate to a soup kitchen or shelter.
- Donate 100 stuffed animals.
- Collect 100 school supply items to donate.

### **Juniors**

- Plant 100 trees.
- Collect 100 pounds of litter.
- Collect 100 items of clothing or winter apparel.
- Educate 100 people about the importance of recycling.
- Make 100 sandwiches to donate to a soup kitchen or shelter.
- Collect 100 eye glasses or cell phones.
- Make 100 ribbons to distribute about your cause.
- Distribute 100 GSME flyers.

### **Cadettes**

- Make/distribute 100 reusable bags.
- Plant 100 produce plants and donate the harvest to a community organization.
- Write 100 letters to servicemen and women.
- Write a 100 word editorial and send it to a newspaper.
- Read to 100 people (elderly or children).

### **Seniors and Ambassadors**

- Volunteer for 100 hours at a local organization.
- Write a letter advocating for something you care about and send it to 100 public officials.

### **Notes:**

- Work on this project can begin October 1, 2011 and the Final Report should be submitted by September 30, 2012.
- If money-earning is required to complete a project, GSME standards and permissions for money-earning must be followed (available on our Website).
- This project is for individual girls to complete; however, if girls in troops work on a project together they must provide the same total of hours or items collectively. For example, if there are five girls in the troop, they would need to collectively provide 500 service hours/items.
- Projects for Daisies, Brownies, and Juniors may be completed in different areas. For example, girls can do 10 actions under 10 different projects for a total of 100 acts of service.
