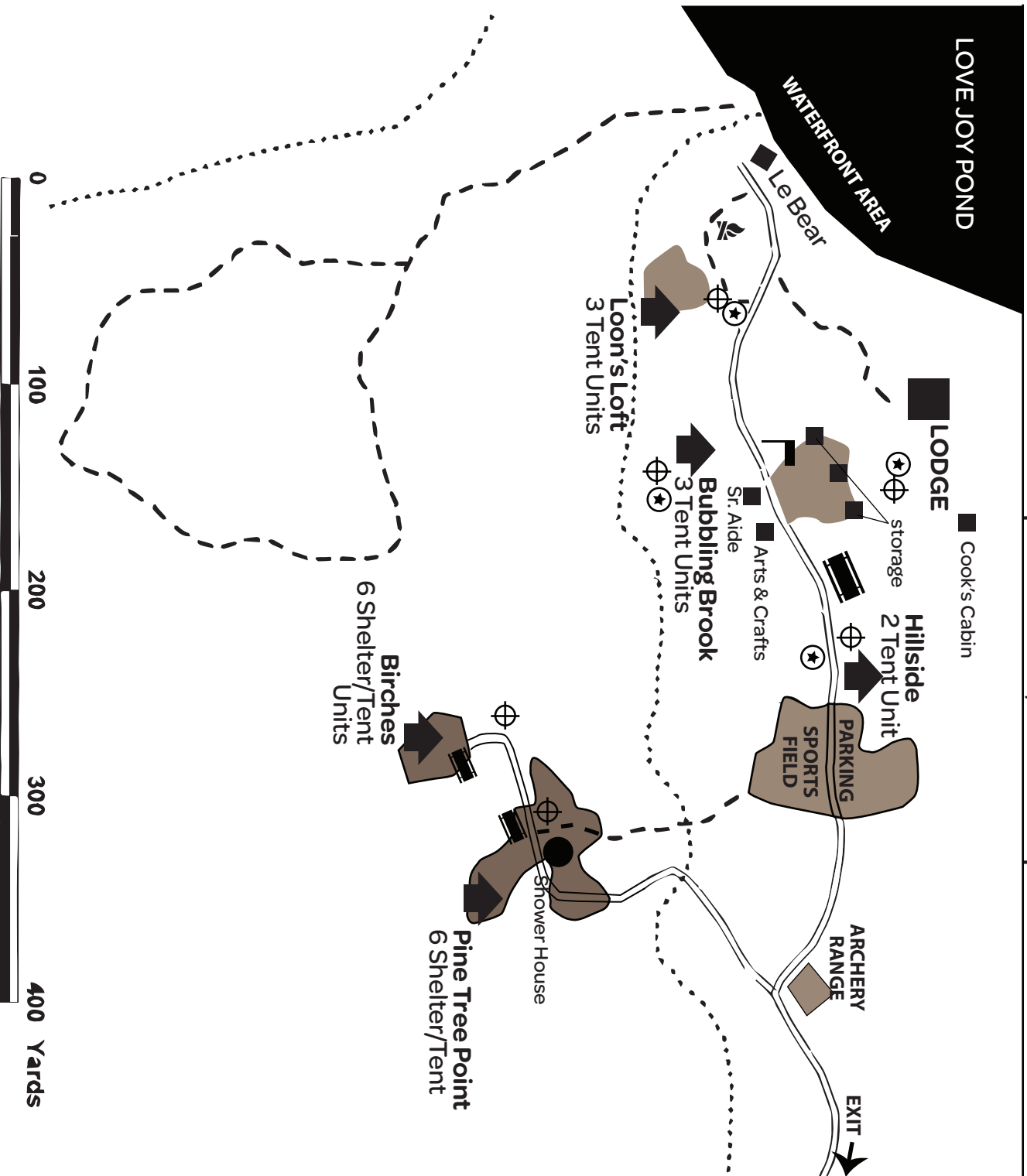

DIRECTIONS TO CAMP KIRKWOLD

177 North Wayne Rd.
Readfield, Me

From Augusta: Take **Rt 202** towards **Winthrop**. Travel **202 west** for **3.2 miles** to **Manchester**. Turn **right** onto **Rt 17** towards **Readfield**.

- ◆ From **Rt 17**, travel **9.4 miles**, through the town of **Readfield** and past the intersection of **Rts 17 & 41**, to **P. Ridge Road**. Turn **left** onto **P. Ridge Road**. Travel **1 mile**, and take **right** onto **Lane Road**. Travel $\frac{7}{10}$ of a mile to **Camp Kirkwold**. The road curves left, becoming **North Wayne Road**. The camp gate is just after the sharp curve.

From the Waterville Area: Take **I-95/Maine Turnpike** south to **Exit 109** onto **Rt 202**, **Winthrop**. Stay on **Rt 202** west for **3.2 miles** to **Manchester**. Turn **right** onto **Rt 17** towards **Readfield**.
Continue with the directions above from the ◆.

From Lewiston/Auburn: Take **Rt 202** towards **Winthrop**. Exit **right** onto **Rt 133**. When the road forks, turn **right** onto **Rt 41**. Take **Rt 41** for **4.8 miles** to the blinking light in **Readfield**. Turn **left** onto **Rt 17**, and continue **1.9 miles**, then turn **left** onto **P. Ridge Road**. Travel **1 mile**, and take **right** onto **Lane Road**. Travel $\frac{7}{10}$ of a mile to **Camp Kirkwold**. The road curves left, becoming **North Wayne Road**. The camp gate is just after the sharp curve.

From All Points South: Take **I-295** north to **I-95/Maine Turnpike** to **Exit 109**. Take **Rt 202**, **Winthrop**. Stay on **Rt 202** to **Manchester**. Turn **right** onto **Rt 17** towards **Readfield**.
Continue with directions above from the ◆.

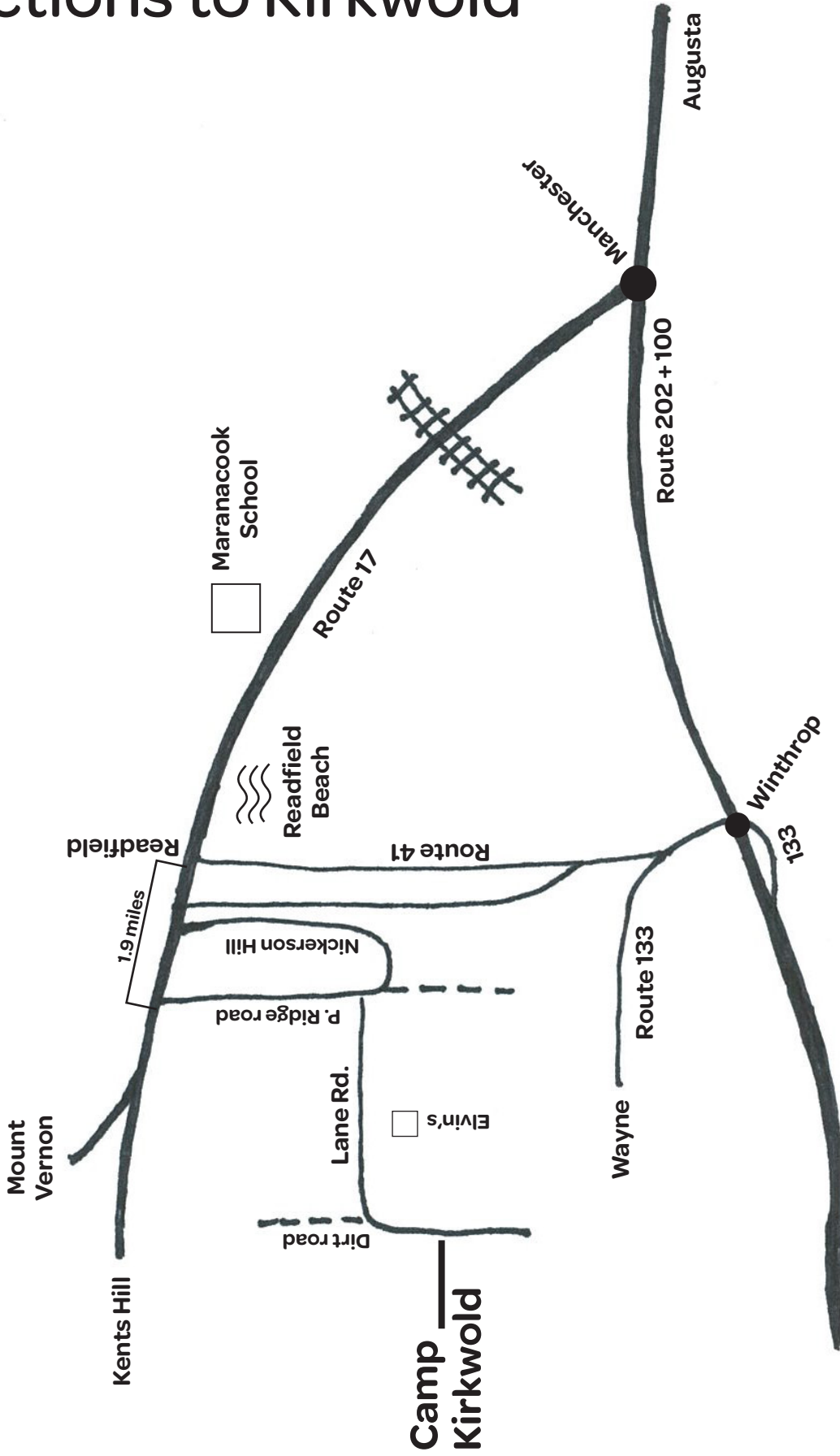
From the Rockland Area: Take **Rt 1** to **Rt 17 west**. Turn **right** onto **Rt 9** in **Augusta** (**Eastern Avenue** - **Rt 17** ends here). Take **Rt 9** to the **first rotary**, and cross the river. Take the **second rotary** to **Rt 202**. Stay on **Rt 202** to **Manchester**. Turn **right** onto **Rt 17** towards **Readfield**.
Continue with directions above from the ◆.

From Farmington: Take **Rt 2 east** to **Rt 41** at **Farmington Falls**. Turn **right** onto **Rt 41** towards **Readfield**. Near **Kents Hill School**, **Rt. 41** merges with **Rt 17**; stay on **Rts 41/17**. Just past the **Readfield Methodist Church**, turn **right** on **P Ridge Road**. Travel **1 mile**, and take **right** onto **Lane Road**. Travel $\frac{7}{10}$ of a mile to **Camp Kirkwold**. The road curves left, becoming **North Wayne Road**. The camp gate is just after the sharp curve.

From Somerset County: Take **Rt 2 east** to **Rt 134**, just before the **New Sharon Bridge**. Turn **left** onto **Rt 134**. When you reach the dead end, turn **left** onto **Rt 41**. Stay on **Rt 41** towards **Readfield**. Near **Kents Hill School**, **Rt. 41** merges with **Rt 17**. Stay on **Rts 41/17**. Just past the **Readfield Methodist Church**, turn **right** onto **P Ridge Road**. Travel **1 mile**, and take **right** onto **Lane Road**. Travel $\frac{7}{10}$ of a mile to **Camp Kirkwold**. The road curves left, becoming **North Wayne Road**. The camp gate is just after the sharp curve.

From Calais, Ellsworth, Belfast: Take **Rt 1** south to **Rt 3 west** in **Belfast**, towards **Augusta**. Follow **Rt 3 west** to **I-95** south. Take **exit 109**, to **Rt. 202**, **Winthrop**. Travel west **3.2 miles** to **Rt 17** in **Manchester**. Turn **right** onto **Rt 17** towards **Readfield**.

Fantastic Weekend Excursions for Troops from Camp Kirkwold in Readfield!

Use Camp Kirkwold as your base – choose nature/hiking, history, or some of both.

WALKS/HIKES – The Natural World

Readfield Fairgrounds: Church Rd, Readfield.

Turn right at an opening in the stone wall.

Walking trails, nature study, second growth forest and wetlands.

Mt. Pisgah, Tower Rd, Winthrop Me. 1 hr. easy hike with great views.

Mount Pisgah is a very well-maintained trail. You can either take the gravel road to the top (BORING!) or take the trail off to the left, which is very well marked. It's accessible all year long; you can even showshoe it in the winter. There's a water tower at the top, with an awesome view of Winthrop and the surrounding area(s). On a clear day, you might see the White Mountains from the tower (usually 1/2 way up-no need to climb to the top of the tower if you're afraid of heights); it's absolutely beautiful! It's a great place to go if you just want to do a short hike.

Torsey Pond Nature Preserve in Readfield

Difficulty: Easy-moderate. The preserve's trail network has 2 miles of trails that travel through mixed forest to the edge of Torsey Pond. The terrain is fairly level. Footing may be tricky in some areas because of roots and long bog bridges. **How to get there:** From the intersection of Route 17 and Route 41 (Chimney Road) in Kents Hill, go 1 mile north on Route 41 to the preserve's small gravel parking lot on the right. The trailhead is at the far end of the parking area.

Information: Torsey Pond Nature Preserve — with mixed forest uplands, a mile of shoreline and significant wading bird and waterfowl habitat — is one of the richest biological areas in Readfield. A wildlife observation blind is located at the edge of Torsey Pond, where visitors can watch a variety of wildlife, including loons, geese, ducks and migratory songbirds. To get there from the trailhead, walk down the Yellow Trail. You'll come to a large wooden footbridge that spans a small stream. After the bridge, the Yellow Trail ends at a juncture with the Green Trail and Blue Trail. Turn right and hike down Green Trail, which ends at the wildlife observation blind.

Viles Arboretum (Geocaching Badge Opportunity!)

Contact is Mark Desmeules mark.desmeules@vilesarboretum.org. 224 acres of fields, forest and wetland make for an ideal setting in which to learn how to geocache. Basic map reading and symbols, using a GPS device go on a treasure nature focused treasure hunt that takes everyone on a cross country adventure to find a geocache. Natural history component. Fees apply, approx \$60 for a 1.5 – 2hr session. Or you can just walk around and learn about the plants and trees at the arboretum. (Formerly The Maine State Arboretum)

Capitol Park, Augusta

A botanical garden and 20 acres of land in front of the State House. Includes walking paths all around it to stretch your legs. It's also near the Maine State Museum and the Kennebec River Rail Trail.

Kennebec River Rail Trail, Augusta

A stunning gateway to Maine's capital city, the Kennebec River Rail-Trail follows the railroad right-of-way that once connected Portland to Augusta. The trail parallels the inactive railroad tracks, which have been maintained in the hope they will one day be used again. Granite quarter-mile markers mimic the original larger markers the railroad once used.

The trail also follows the 120-mile Kennebec River, a historic waterway named by the Abnaki Indians and meaning "long, quiet waters." Once extremely polluted, the river is now a thriving habitat for fish and wildlife, largely because of clean water laws and the removal of Edwards Dam, built in Augusta in 1837. Atlantic salmon, striped bass and American shad, as well as alewife, blueback herring, and rainbow smelt, visit the Kennebec. The river also shelters one of the few extant breeding populations of the rare Atlantic sturgeon. Don't be surprised if you spot a bald eagle soaring the river hoping for a good catch.

Vaughan Woods & Historic Homestead Hallowell, ME

Vaughan woods is a nature preserve featuring three miles of trails, six stone-arch bridges, towering pines, and waterfalls. A beautiful respite from the rush of everyday life. For directions/parking info: <http://vaughanhomestead.org/directions-parking/>

History & Science

Maine State Museum, Augusta. 83 Maine 27, Augusta, ME 04333. (207) 287-2301

Something new always awaits you at the Maine State Museum. The museum's four floors of world-class exhibits all feature great stories, lots of [opportunities](#) for discovery and learning, and stunning objects from the museum's world-class collections. It's a chance to explore and discover the best of Maine, from the Ice Age to the present. Hours: Tuesday - Friday, 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.; Saturday from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.; Sunday from 1:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. Closed on Mondays and all state holidays. FREE?

Fun GS fact: Troops can call ahead to ask to see a birch bark canoe that was made by hand on the Kirkwold property when it was still Camp Merrywold: "In May 1930 Jock Gabriel, an Indian who was believed to be Miss Kirk's handyman, found a huge white birch which had fallen in a storm and made the canoe which now hangs in the dining room. The birch fell around the council ring area." The canoe hung at Kirkwold for many years but now is in storage at the museum.

Samantha Smith Statue

The statue is located next to the entrance of the Maine State Museum in Augusta. 83 Maine 27, Augusta, ME 04333 <http://mainestatemuseum.org/> Statue of Maine schoolgirl who became famous after sharing letters with the President of the Soviet Union to appeal for peace. Discuss her inspiring story.

Old Fort Western

Location:

Home of the country's oldest wooden garrison building, built in 1754, Old Fort Western is a living history museum offering tours to groups and individuals, engaging hands-on activities and unique interactive experiences involving the history of the Kennebec Valley and New England during the 17th, 18th and 19th centuries.

State Capitol & Blaine House (Governor's Mansion), Augusta

The seat of Maine's government. The Maine State Museum arranges tours but there are no weekend tours. Girls who have never seen the State Capitol may enjoy a drive by the beautiful domed building, and getting a glimpse of the Blaine House right across the street.

LC Bates Museum, Hinckley, ME.

The museum includes amazing natural history exhibits, fun local history, Native American collections, rocks and minerals, fossils, outside nature trails, picnic tables, and an arboretum behind the museum. CAMP KIRKWOLD GUIDELINES

General Information

Camp Kirkwold belongs to all of us, and it is only with everyone's cooperation that we can keep it in good shape for the campers that follow. Please leave all areas as you would like to find them.

- Check In/** Check-in and out is on your own. You will be mailed keys 2 weeks before your rental.
- Check Out** Please make sure you follow your check-out sheet before leaving the site. Close and lock all buildings and the entrance gate as you leave. Please mail keys back promptly after your rental is over.
- Ranger** Berndt Graf is the seasonal site manager; he does not live at the camp. You may call him on weekdays to ask specific questions about the facilities and your stay. Tel: 207-289-6317. He will work with you to set up camp for your stay. He is generally not on site on weekends.
- Equipment provided: Kitchen:**
Basic cooking pots, pans & utensils. Troops must provide their own plates, cups and cutlery.
- Fire Rings:**
Shovel, rake, broom and grates are provided.
- What to bring** **Troops need to supply all consumables** – toilet paper, paper towels, napkins, trash bags, cleaning supplies, soap, first aid supplies and other consumable items; pot holders, dish towels.
- Cooking/Fires** According to GSUSA Safety Activity Check Points, Girl Scouts don't cook any major meals on an open fire because of environmental reasons, as well as the girls' health. The new guideline is that girls and leaders may not burn any wood bigger than their wrist. A stick fire can be fun to feed, and will burn as long as you have sticks and the best part is, it will go out quickly.
- Conserve** Please be careful with water, electric and fuel use. It is important we conserve our resources.
- Emergency Procedures** A fire drill should be planned with your group. Also, please discuss with your campers what to do in case of bad weather; if they become separated from their group, a medical emergency, or intruder, and rabies and Lyme disease precautions.
- Firewood** Due to the threat of invasive species, **do not bring firewood to camp.** Please plan to collect wood at camp. Only use downed dead wood for campfires, and build fires in designated areas. Establish and review Fire Safety Guidelines with your group.
- Garbage/Trash** **Remove all food from the site & cabinets at departure.** All trash and garbage **must be taken out with you.** Maine State Law prohibits the burning of trash. Check all areas and grounds for debris.
- Indoor Facilities** The Lodge and picnic shelter are available as rainy day program areas for all troops camping in tent units. Please share with all troops on site. Make sure building is clean, all trash is removed, lights are out, and building is locked when you depart. See checklists following and clean up accordingly.
- Keys** The keys will be mailed to you several weeks before your trip. Please return them promptly so others may use the site.

Telephone	There is no land line phone at Kirkwold. Groups must bring personal cell phones for use during their camp stay.
Parking	Please park all vehicles in the designated parking lot. One vehicle can stay at the site for emergency purposes. All vehicles should be parked facing out.
Vehicles	Only use to transport gear to campsite; never use to transport girls to activity areas, even in rain. Speed limit is 10 mph. Excess vehicle traffic is a safety hazard and can damage roads.
Waterfront & Archery	There is boating and swimming in Lovejoy Pond. Use of the waterfront area is by special permission and certified staff are required. A certified archery instructor is required to use the archery range. Separate rental fees apply for boating & archery. Call the South Portland service center at (207) 772-1177 or 1-888-922-4763 for an application.

TROOP CAMP AND OUTSIDE GROUP GUIDELINES FOR ALL SITES

The adult leader of each group is responsible for the compliance of these rules by her/his group.

1. Girl Scouts groups must check Safety Activity Checkpoints for all activities.
2. Use of the waterfront area is by special permission and must be supervised by certified adults; contact the Girl Scout office to request an application and guidelines.
3. Use of the challenge course at Pondicherry and archery range at all sites is for Girl Scout groups only, contact the GSME office for an application and guidelines. No archery at Scelkit.
4. Groups are responsible for any personal equipment they bring.
5. The use of liquid fuel and propane is prohibited unless used as part of a GSME approved training or program. (Troop camping is an approved program if a leader has completed the appropriate training.)
6. The use of power and hand tools are allowed with trained adult supervision. (see Safety Activity Checkpoints)
7. Due to the threat of invasive species, **do not bring firewood to camp.** Please plan to collect wood at camp. Only use downed dead wood for campfires.
8. No pets are allowed in camp except service animals.
9. Alcoholic beverages and illegal drugs are prohibited.
10. Smoking is prohibited.
11. The use of snowmobiles, ATV and riding in non-passenger vehicles or parts of vehicles not designated for passengers, is prohibited.
12. Weapons, fireworks, ammunition and explosives are prohibited.
13. Observe posted signs for restricted areas (maintenance shop, waterfront, archery range, climbing rock, solar panel arrays, challenge course – varies by site). Restricted activity areas may only be used when open for programming and staffed by certified instructors.
14. Be aware of uneven terrain and many roots and rocks on all of our sites.
15. Stay within the camp boundaries (see site map) and use marked trails and paths.

HELPFUL HINTS

if you are camping at:

TENT SITES

(Hillside, Bubbling Brook, Loon's Loft)

- Water** is available from May 15 - mid-October. Cold water only.
- Lighting** There is no electricity in the camping area. You must provide your own lanterns.
- Telephone** There is no landline phone at the camp. Groups must bring cell phones for emergency purposes.
- Latrines** A latrine is located in your camping area. Please do not throw anything down the pit, except toilet paper.
- Sleeping** is on metal cots with mattresses in the canvas tents. Each tent can sleep 4-5 people. Do not use anything with an open flame in the tents.
- Cooking** is on camp stoves or charcoal. If you choose to cook over a fire pit in your unit, please follow all Fire Safety Checkpoints.
Remove all food from the site upon departure.
- Equipment** The following equipment is available for your use: 3 pots, 1 fry pan, dishpans, long-handled spoon, slotted spoon, spatula, tongs, fire bucket, grate, shovel, broom, and saw.

Unit box cooking items should be clean and dry before you leave. Keep unit boxes under cover of the pavilion; in sites with no pavilion (Loon's Loft & Bubbling Brook), store box inside a tent.

Sleeping Accomodations

Hillside: 2 tents, 4 cots each = 8 cots
Bubbling Brook: 3 tents, 4 cots each = 12 cots
Loon's Loft: 3 tents, 4 cots each = 12 cots

An additional cot can be added in each tent if desired – make arrangements in advance with the site manager.

SHELTER SITES

(Pine Tree Point, Birches)

- Water** is available from May 15 - mid-October. Cold water only.
- Lighting** There is no electricity in the camping areas. You must provide your own lanterns.
- Telephone** There is no landline at Kirkwold; groups must bring cell phones.
- Bathrooms** A building with flush toilets is shared by campers in Pine Tree Point and Birches. Cleaning directions are posted in the building. Cold water only.
- Sleeping** is on built-in wooden bunk beds with mattresses in each shelter. Each shelter will accommodate 5 people. Do not use anything with an open flame in the shelters.
- Cooking** is on camp stoves or charcoal. If you choose to cook over a fire pit in your unit, please follow all fire safety checkpoints.
Remove all food from the cabinets and site upon departure.
- Equipment** The following equipment is available for your use: 3 pots, 1 fry pan, dishpans, long-handled spoon, slotted spoon, spatula, tongs, fire bucket, grate, shovel, broom, and saw. *These items are stored in unit boxes in the unit pavilion.* All equipment should be clean and dry before you leave.

Sleeping Accomodations

Pine Tree Point: 6 tent shelters, 5 bunks each = 30 bunks
Birches: 6 tent shelters, 5 bunks each = 30 bunks

An additional mattress can be added to a tent shelter if desired (sleeping is on the floor) -- make arrangements in advance with the site manager. With additional mattress, 12 more persons can be accommodated.

Troop Camping Lodge Kitchen Checklist

- Clean all equipment used and store dry.
- Clean stovetop, ovens, back splash and oven sides, doors & racks
- Clean microwave, inside & out
- If used: Wash all dishes, glasses, silverware, pots & pans, utensils, storage & serving containers and store properly.
- Clean refrigerators inside and out – **remove all food**. Turn off and leave doors propped open.
- Remove all food from cabinets.
- Wash all sinks, inside & out.
- Wash all counters
- Sweep & mop floors

- Collect trash from all areas inside & outside. Take trash with you.
- Vacuum or sweep floors.
- Close and lock all windows and doors.
- Check to see that no personal equipment is left behind.
- Wipe tables and benches and put them back in place. **(Please lift tables, dragging them harms the table legs and floors.)**
- Clean out brooms – shake them **outside** or vacuum them. Store brooms bristle side UP.
- Shake out all entrance rugs.
- Clean out fireplace (if used).
- Stack wood neatly in wood box.
